The National Patient Safety Goals are safety standards that directly impact the way Registered Nurses practice, both at the bedside and within their organizations. RN's, alongside physicians, pharmacists, risk managers, clinical engineers, and other professionals, serve on the Patient Safety Advisory Group that formulates and revises the Safety Goals.

The nurse-to-patient ratio is only one aspect of the relationship between nursing workload and patient safety. Overall nursing workload is likely linked to patient outcomes as well. A sophisticated 2011 study showed that increased patient turnover was also associated with increased mortality risk, even when overall nurse staffing was considered adequate.
